Opportunities for Youth (OFY) is a collaborative partnership among government agencies, nonprofit organizations and employers that was launched in 2015 in response to the unfortunate emergence of Maricopa County as one of the country's most concentrated populations of young people, aged 16-24, who are not in school and not working. Seeing the chance to leverage the resources of Arizona State University to address this critical issue, Dean Jonathan Koppell created a home for OFY in the Watts College of Public Service and Community Solutions in 2017. To amplify our ability to positively impact the lives of "opportunity youth," the College formed the Center for Human Capital and Youth Development (CHCYD). CHCYD is a hub through which faculty, researchers, students, community partners, youth, and policymakers can collaborate on research, practice, and policy initiatives to support the educational, career and life goals of Maricopa County's Youth.

OFY works to lower the rate of opportunity youth in the Greater Phoenix Area by supporting the many organizations and employers working in this arena by convening partners and essential constituencies, facilitating countywide systems change, and connecting youth with resources and opportunities for success. In these roles, we rely on the active participation of youth, service providers, educational partners and employers to inform and guide OFY's ongoing efforts to develop solutions in existing educational and employment systems. Since OFY does not directly serve youth, we acknowledge that our efforts are only as effective as they are meaningful to youth, community partners, and employers, and so we depend on their participation in developing these solutions. We also would like to take this opportunity to thank our funders for supporting the OFY initiative, and making it possible to maintain our momentum in the Greater Phoenix Area as well as helping us to achieve our 2018 accomplishments.

Youth Outreach & Retention

Outreach Overview


In 2018, the OFY Outreach Team focused on meeting opportunity youth where they already were, increasing overall effectiveness. This included visiting youth-specific locations and events, through social media platforms, and by engaging youth and service providers within other systems serving OY (i.e., child welfare, criminal justice, education institutions, and housing/homelessness systems).

Outreach Data

OFY partnered with AmeriCorps Public Allies to employ eight Recruitment Specialists in 2018, establishing the OFY Youth Outreach Team. With the objective to expand community outreach efforts, this team educated local youth about the resources and opportunities offered by OFY Reengagement Centers. In an area as expansive as the Greater Phoenix Area, where nearly 14% of the total youth population are OY, it is vital to devise more innovative approaches to youth outreach. For this reason, we focused on developing new ways (e.g., through social media, community canvassing, etc.) to connect with youth and bring awareness to the resources that OFY and our partners offer.



OFY and its 14 Reengagement Centers conducted outreach to 27,738 opportunity youth (compared to just 6,000 in 2017). Of those youth, OFY Reengagement Centers enrolled 4,270 in services (2,200 in 2017). Over half (52%) of those young people pursued an educational pathway, whereas 25% pursued a career pathway and 23% received basic needs services within the Centers.



In addition to outreach, OFY focused on retention by strengthening the youth referral process and optimizing communications between Reengagement Centers.

The Youth We Serve

OFY's 2018 data, collected amongst 14 Reengagement Centers, suggest the following demographic distribution among the youth we served:

- 51.0% White
- 18.7% Black/African American
- 4.8% American Indian/ Alaskan Native
- . 2.7% Asian/Pacific Islander
- 6.2% Mixed Race
- 16.6% Not Recorded

In addition to this racial breakdown, 54.4% of the population served indicated that they identify as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity*. We have been able to gain a better understanding of the obstacles local youth face in Maricopa County, by better getting to know these young people themselves.

These data also suggest that youth from the following special population groups sought services from the Reengagement Centers:

^{*} These statistics were determined using American Community Survey methodology. In accordance with these methods, the ethnicity of Hispanic/Latino is represented separately from "Race", and is not considered in the population's racial breakdown.

Educational Momentum


In 2018, OFY hosted an Educational Momentum Breakfast, aiming to build capacity and support networks for youth in the Greater Phoenix Area. Through this expansion of the Education Momentum Action Team, OFY is better able to serve youth at risk of disengagement from an educational pathway.



We have been working with local schools to implement a referral system aimed at bridging the resource gap for youth who are at risk of or have recently dropped out of school. This allows us to provide a "warm hand-off" between educational institutions and Reengagement Centers before

youth leave the education system, as it becomes more difficult to target and reengage these young people in support services after they have become disengaged.

Of youth enrolled in services through a Reengagement Center, 52% chose to pursue an educational pathway. Of those who enrolled in a high school (or equivalent) program, 44% are doing so through an alternative program.



Career Connections

OFY Career Connections organized six hiring events in 2017-2018, connecting local employers and youth. Through these events, OFY engaged a total of 101 employers and 1,513 youth, and hosted over 200 interviews, which resulted in 93 on-site job offers!



OFY also implemented a new Manufacturing Training Program in 2018, laying the foundation for a new partnership among GateWay Community College, ARIZONA@WORK Maricopa County and the City of Phoenix, and OFY.

This innovative partnership uses federal and philanthropic funding to pay for youths' education in manufacturing, a nationally recognized credential, and ongoing support services.



In December 2018, the first cohort of the Manufacturing Training Program graduated, with 75% of participants continuing their education at GateWay Community College and 25% using their new certification to enter the workforce.

Infrastructure Development

OFY is building capacity through the development of a cross-sectoral infrastructure, through its Leadership Council and four Action Teams. The work of the Leadership Council is imperative to providing strategic vision for and oversight of the OFY Initiative. This includes the development of a common agenda that defines strategies for political advocacy, community engagement, and shared metrics.

In addition to the Leadership Council, OFY's four Action Teams: Career Connections, Educational Momentum, Reengagement Centers, and Youth Leadership & Development, focus on eliminating barriers that affect youth. Supported by OFY staff, these teams are comprised of professionals and youth leaders in each of these areas. They convene on a monthly basis to examine the issues affecting OY and develop strategic solutions. Action Team co-chairs also meet bi-monthly outside of the Leadership Council to identify and implement overarching solutions to support OY in reengaging in educational and career pathways.





By the end of 2018, OFY increased overall partner participation by 52%, with Leadership Council membership increasing from 25 to 32 individuals, Career Connections partnerships increasing from 16 to 32 employers, Educational Momentum partnerships increasing from 19 to 30 organizations, and Reengagement Center partnerships increasing from 12 to 16 agencies.

In addition to building capacity in our community, OFY also has been implementing systems changes at the Action Team level. Each team has begun to identify gaps in policies and services within their focus area that hinder effective youth outcomes, and is developing solutions to remedy those issues.

Finally, OFY has effectively diversified the initiative's funding portfolio by increasing its operating budget from \$75,224 in July 2017 to \$958,830 by the end of 2018, with support from 11 private and public funders.
