Arizona's Children Association support services and mentor program is designed to aid foster care youth between the ages of 16 and 21 who have or will be transitioning out of Arizona State or Tribal Foster Care. They provide skills and support to more than 1,000 youth and young adults in their transition into independence each year by assisting them in gaining skills for self-sufficiency. Eligibility

- 16 to 21-year-old males and females
- Have expressed wanting a mentor
- Participate in their Young Adult Services Program
- Currently involved with the Department of Child Safety or working with the Transitional Independent Living Program
- Reside in group homes, foster homes, respite homes, kinship homes, residential treatment centers, and transitional living placements located throughout the state
- Youth are matched with their mentor based on interests and location

Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections (ADJC)

The Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections (ADJC) Mentoring Program assists high risk youth to be successful as they transition back to their communities. It is a faith-based program that also includes community and secular mentor opportunities so that all youth have access to their individual preference. The goal of their Mentoring Program are to provide high risk youth with a caring adult who can:

- Participate in the youth's transition planning;
- Help the youth prioritize and set goals;
- Be a friend and a role model;
- Support and encourage the youth;
- Assist the youth and their family with practical needs through faith and community contacts;
- Introduce youth to work experience opportunities through faith and community contacts; and
- Be called upon in a variety of ways that are individual to the needs of the youth.

The Mentoring Program requires that youth and mentors are gender matched and when possible, youth and mentors will be the same race/ethnicity, be in proximate geographic locations, and have similar interests. ADJC staff are expected to have contact with mentors for mentoring and supervision purposes two (2) to four (4) times per month and mentors are expected to provide ADJC staff with written/oral reports regarding their contacts with youth on a monthly basis.

The Arizona Youth Leadership Forum (AZYLF) is facilitated by Diverse Ability Incorporated, in partnership with the AZYLI Alumni Association, and is funded in part by Arizona Rehabilitation Services Administration, and Arizona Statewide Independent Living Council. Arizona Youth Leadership Forum (AZYLF) is an innovative, multi-day conference, held in multiple regions of Arizona each summer. AZYLF is absolutely free for the youth who are selected, who are referred to as Delegates. This year, AZYLF Regional Conferences will be held online via Zoom, where Delegates can participate from the safety and comfort of their own homes. Actual costs are calculated at \$1,850 per Delegate, which does not include in-kind goods and services donated by volunteer supporters. Up to 25 youth from across Arizona are selected to participate in each AZYLF conference, through a competitive application process. The AZYLF conference successfully integrates youth who represent the diversity of disability and culture in Arizona.

The Mayor's Youth Advisory Commission (MYAC) was established in 1980 in response to the problems youth often face, such as teen violence, pregnancy, substance abuse, depression, and lack of recreational opportunities. While discussed as part of the problem, youth had no voice in local government and were not included as part of the solution. Tempe recognized the importance of youth input and created an advisory commission made up 100% of youth. The Commission reports directly to the Mayor and City Council.

Phoenix Youth and Education Commission

The Phoenix Youth and Education Commission voting members shall have the following powers and duties: 1) Review local, regional and national educational issues and recommend the implementation or promotion of those approaches that show the greatest promise to enhance the quality of education within the City. 2) Assist the City in its efforts to develop constructive working relationships with those organizations and sectors of the community that are concerned with promoting youth development and quality education within the City. 3) Promote the exchange of information on youth development and public education. 4) Recommend policies and programs to the City Council that will improve the quality of life for youth residing within the City and advise the City Council concerning opportunities and challenges relating to youth. 5) Report to the City Council on the activities of the Commission with appropriate recommendations. 6) Be responsible for the operation of the educational access channels reserved by the cable television operators licensed by the City of Phoenix; adopt bylaws and develop policies and procedures for the use of the educational access channels; and, may arrange for the use of the facilities, equipment and personnel available for other access channels to produce and program the educational access channel. 7) By September 1 of each year, the Commission will submit a report to the City Council, setting forth the Commission's efforts, results and future plans.

Youth & Government helps young people define the community action they wish to take, and teaches youth the legislative and judicial processes to facilitate social change. This semester-long program is hosted through several experiential virtual meetings. YAG leads students through topics such as parliamentary procedure, political parties, media, voting, bill writing and debate policy. The semester concludes with the Model Legislature & Court Conference held each year during the first weekend in December at the Arizona State Capitol. During this capstone experience delegates will debate their bills in the State House and Senate, run for office, write a daily newspaper and host State Supreme Court hearings.

The Arizona Youth & Government Program is open to all Arizona students from 6th-12th grade. Participants strengthen their communities by becoming active and responsible contributors who are inspired to lead, and are empowered to become agents of meaningful change in their communities. Now is the time for every Arizona student to get involved. If you are in grades 6-12 and are passionate about your community and want to get involved, hone your skills and gain a broader perspective on state, national, or international politics and policy, then Youth and Government is for you.
